The Early Learning Goal for Personal, Social and Emotional Development


Children play co-operatively, taking turns with others. They take account of one another's ideas about how to organise their activity. They show sensitivity to others' needs and feelings, and form positive relationships with adults and other children.

What will teachers do to help...

- Provide opportunities for children to play and work in different groups, with different children and adults.
- Support children in finding solutions to problems by talking things through.
- Support children in recognising when they haven't made a 'good choice' and in saying sorry and helping children to forgive.

What parents can do...

- Encourage your child to share and take turns. Play board games which encourage turn taking and winning and losing (this can be a tough lesson to learn).
- Support your child in recognising when they haven't made a good choice and the importance of being sorry.
- Help your child to know, that we all make mistakes and every new day is a new start to try again.



Thank you to all the parents who have returned their parental consent for your child to use Seesaw.

We will be using Seesaw in class but especially should your child need to self isolate so that they can continue to work and learn from home.

Seesaw can be used to set work, give feedback and also directly communicate with your child's class teacher.
